Why leave a legacy to William Harvey Research

William Harvey Research (WHR) was established in 1986 by Sir John Vane, who won a Nobel Prize for establishing how aspirin works (among many other discoveries). Sir John Vane's original small team has grown into an internationally-recognised institute comprising over 500 scientists from around the world. WHR has a global research reputation in the medical world but remains relatively unknown outside scientific circles; this has limited its ability to attract financial support.

The Foundation benefits from income generated by the commercial activities of WHR (contract research, medical training programmes, and conference organising), but it has no endowment; we are therefore seeking support from benefactors, including alumni. One way to help is by including WHR in your Will: legacies allow the Foundation to continue its tradition of supporting excellence in research, and the top priority for legacy support is to build an endowment, thus ensuring that the Foundation can respond to the Institute's research needs in the future.

Making a Will

Ensuring your estate is allocated as you would wish, by making a Will, is important: firstly, it saves problems for your family, because when someone dies intestate, the law dictates how the estate is divided. Intestacy can also mean that more Inheritance Tax than necessary is paid, and that the beneficiaries are not necessarily those you would have chosen.

Legacy gifts

There are several different ways of leaving a legacy.

Pecuniary: a simple legacy of a specified sum.

Residuary: the residue of your estate (after other legacies and expenses have been paid).

Conditional: if none of your named dependants/ beneficiaries survive you.

Reversionary: leaving assets to Trustees for the benefit of beneficiaries during their lifetime; they enjoy the income, and the assets are transferred (e.g. to WHR) after their deaths.

Non-monetary: gifts such as investments, property, art etc. can be bequeathed.

In addition, if you are a beneficiary under a Will, you can transfer all or part of this inheritance by Deed of Variation (such transfers are free of Inheritance Tax).

If you have already made a Will, the easiest way to include an additional legacy is by adding a codicil; forms overleaf show how gifts to WHRF can be made.
